On May 3, the Church Council will be going on our annual retreat at Mt. Olivet Retreat Center. Please remember them in your prayers.


Our Council Highlights include our need to maintain our property. A well-cared for building is welcoming.

Formerly Director of Lifespan Religious Education at the Universalist Church of West Hartford, Connecticut, and director of Christian Formation at Manassas Presbyterian Church in Virginia.

Born: Indianapolis, Indiana

Hometown: I have lived in every region of the United States, and I feel most at home in St. Paul, Minnesota.

College: Indiana University, bachelor of arts degree in theatre and drama; Emory University, master's degree in theological studies; Graduate Theological Union, doctoral degree in art and religion.

Career: Ecumenical religious educator in congregational and university settings. Spent 20 years directing stage plays.

Family: Husband, Jim Taylor, is a screenwriter and a political consultant; spoiled dog, Rosie.

Odds & Ends:

"My first experience serving a congregation was in a UCC church. I had just completed my master's coursework at Candler School of Theology in Atlanta. I returned home to Indiana to finish up my thesis. While doing so, I took on a number of roles at St. Peter's United Church of Christ—confirmation leader, worship assistant, children's church leader, and office administrator. I answered this substantial first call as one "unchurched." I was a true convert in my late 20s, called to a life of faith. I found myself in the midst of rigorous theological study, serving a church in a professional capacity, and having a "mountain top" experience — all at once. I was fortunate to have had such a nourishing "first church" experience.

"A few years later, I found myself teaching and preaching at St. Paul's UCC in Minnesota as a part-time religious educator. While living and working in the Twin Cities from 2005 to 2010, I met and married my spouse before leaving the state to begin my doctoral program in Berkeley, California.

"Since then, I have adventured away from congregational leadership into academic research and teaching and back again to the church. Most recently, I was director of Religious Education for a Presbyterian Church (USA) in Virginia, then a heritage Unitarian Universalist congregation in West Hartford, Connecticut. In two years with my Unitarian folks, I revitalized and grew our educational program far beyond expectation. (One indication of our success was a recent child dedication that included six new families and eight infants, toddlers, and preschoolers.)

"Across the spectrum of religious education, I excel in two areas: helping parents live into their role as their children's best spiritual teachers; and leading compelling adult ed programs, especially for empty nester and older adults."

Friends of College Monfant ~ Gala at St. Peter's

Back in 2021 many of you contributed to the Bake for the Bus sale which raised over \$3000 for a second school bus for a Lutheran school in the suburbs of Dakar, Senegal. The next year, we joined with St. John's and Bethel to collect three suitcases worth of school supplies which my daughters and I hand-delivered in August of 2022. During our visit, we got on the bus, toured the facilities, and met the staff. While impressed with the ingenuity of school leaders to make classrooms out of windowless garages, we recognized that better spaces were needed. Just this month, I received a video of students moving into a brand new building thanks to donations from congregations and individuals like us.

This past Christmas, many of you contributed to a bake sale as part of our Lessons and Carols coffee hour. This time our SPY kids were given a gift catalog from Lutheran World Relief and told to pick a project. They chose to put the proceeds toward school supplies. As with the bus project, proceeds exceeded expectations threefold and we sent \$941 to LWR. This, in addition to the school bags many of us faithfully fill each September that are shipped to children in need all over the world through the same organization.

St. Peter's is again making a tangible contribution to global education by donating space for the Friends of College Monfant to host a gala fundraising dinner on **Saturday, May 10 from 6-9 pm**. FCM is a local non-profit which serves as a vehicle for individuals to support scholarships, food subsidies, and help with capital improvement projects at a Catholic girls school in northern Togo. We are connected to the school through Northfield resident and St. Peter's neighbor, Nalongue Virginie Cogan who is a 1984 alum. St. Peter's members are covering key operational positions such as managing the kitchen and volunteers. Richard Collman will be our MC, an African drumming group from Carleton will perform, and Ruth's on Stafford will cater a delicious meal.

When I was growing up in Senegal the area where my parents worked was almost 100% Muslim but there were a few government employees from the southern part of the country who were Roman Catholic. A group of about 15 would gather on Sundays in our living room to worship together. Ten years later when I returned for a summer, my former bedroom had become a nursery school classroom and worshippers gathered on the veranda. Today, in that same town, Linguere, there are both Lutheran and Catholic congregations, each with their own spaces. The Catholic school which occupied our former house got its own facility and they host ELCA Young Adults in Global Mission volunteers every year.

I feel privileged to be part of a town and congregation that values education, through our own youth programming and through enthusiastic participation in projects that benefit children in other parts of the world. I hope that many of you will register (by May 5) to attend what promises to be a unique and fun evening in our building. RSVP is at collegemonfant.org. Council Highlights

To express God's love and grace in building a community where people **believe** in God, **belong** to Christ, and **become** disciples who serve in day-to-day living.

Call to Order: Kleppe called the meeting to order at 7:05 p.m. in the Fireside Room.

Devotion: Eaves read the 1921 Myra Brooks Welch poem, "The Touch of the Master's Hand," and the story from Exodus 4 of Moses attempting to avoid God's invitation of leadership. The lesson was that God uses ordinary people to do extraordinary things.

Reports

Pastor: Patricia McKee, our Christian Life Coordinator, started work April 8, attending the staff meeting. Attendance at Lenten worship services has been good. An average of about 30 people have attended soup suppers preceding the services. Attendance at confirmation classes has been stronger than usual during Lent. Palm Sunday service will feature the "Cry of the Whole Congregation" dramatic reading. A new-member class will be held the three Sundays following Easter. New members will be received May 18. The Welcome Summer activity of hamburgers, hot dogs and games will be May 14. High school seniors will be recognized May 18. The Synod Assembly is May 30-31 in Rochester. Pastor and Bryn Bridley will chaperone five middle school youth to the ELCA's Christikon summer camp in the Absaroka-Beartooth wilderness of Montana July 19-27.

Council President: Kleppe led a brief walking tour of the south wing to highlight possible maintenance issues. A list is being developed for prioritizing churchwide repairs and maintenance. Spring cleanup by congregation volunteers will be divided between April 16 and May 17. The Personnel Committee will conduct staff evaluations by early May.

Treasurer: Link presented the March financial report. Envelope/pledge offerings during the five Sundays in March were 16 percent (\$3,600) below budget projections. Year-to-date giving through March was 19 percent (\$12,500) below budget. The Change 4 Change program (loose coins and bills) raised \$501 for Northfield's Community Action Center. ELCA Disaster Relief will be the recipient of April and May Change 4 Change offerings.

New Business: The Church Council retreat will be May 3 at Mount Olivet Retreat Center. The Council will dig deeper into a congregational survey completed a year ago and will work on five- and 10-year plans. Carpool riders will leave the church at 8:30 a.m. The retreat is scheduled to end at 3 p.m.

Looking Ahead: Executive Board meets at 10 a.m., June 8. Church Council meets at 7 p.m., June 10.

A synod staffer will be invited to present a Fellowship Hour talk about the synod's role in a migrant ministry program of Lutheran Advocacy-Minnesota. The initiative is known as AMMPARO, an acronym derived from the Spanish word for protecting a living creature from suffering or harm.
